- Five years is the age for the study of Scripture. [Leviticus]
- · Ten, for the study of Mishnah.
- Thirteen, for the obligation to observe the mitzvot. [Old enough to fast on YK.]
- Fifteen, for the study of Talmud.
- · Eighteen, for marriage.
- Twenty, to pursue [a livelihood].
- Thirty, for strength.



American rabbi Mordecai M. Kaplan, who held the first public celebration of a bat mitzvah in the United States, for his daughter Judith, on March 18, 1922, at the Society for the Advancement of Judaism, his synagogue in New York City. [Quite shocking to observers. In my day, Bat Mitzvahs were less common than Bar Mitzvahs. My sister's Jewish education was just skipped. She never had a Bat Mitzvah.]

Judith Kaplan recited the preliminary blessing, read a portion of that week's Torah portion in Hebrew and English, and then intoned the closing blessing.



Next innovation I don't approve of at all. NEVER be done at Or HaOlam.

On July 10th, 1977, the first <u>Bark Mitzvah</u> took place in West Orange New Jersey. Marvin and Thebe Drazin held a Bark Mitzvah for their dog Schnoppsie-Lewis Drazin in their backyard.

daughter בַּת

(religion) commandment, precept; decree, edict; good deed, act of kindness מָצְוָה

[Daughter and commandment seem opposite.

Daughter is the epitome of beloved and precious.

Commandment sound legal, military.

It's being engaged, involved, enamored with the TRUTH of the Word. The daughterhood dimension is because the Word is a love letter of family identity. Covenantal family identity. Covenant is the key word. Shortly Naomi's parents, Michael & Tova, will recite the following over her.]

So let's explore the tie between Daughter of Commandments, and the covenant.]

Yermiyahu 31.31-33 "Hey! the days are coming," says Adoni, "when I will make a new covenant with the house of Isra'el and with the house of Y'hudah..."For this is the covenant I will make with the house of Isra'el after those days," says Adoni: "I will put my Torah within them and write it on their hearts; I will be their God, and they will be my people. No longer will any of them teach his fellow community member or his brother, 'Know Adoni'; for all will know me, from the least of them to the greatest; because I will forgive their wickednesses and remember their sins no more."

The covenant is expressed in the Torah teachings and commandments.

Daughter of the Commandments =

(Bat Mitzvah)

Daughter of the Covenant

Yn 14.15-19 "If you love me, you will keep my commands; and I will ask the Father, and he will give you another comforting Counselor like me, the Spirit of Truth, to be with you forever...I will not leave you orphans -- I am coming to you ... In just a little while, the world will no longer see me; but you will see me. Because I live, you too will live.

[You will see Him if you are regularly in the Word.]

Thillim/Ps 112.1 Halleluyah! How happy is anyone who fears ADONI, who greatly delights in his mitzvot.

Thillim/Ps 119.30-32 I choose the way of trust; I set your rulings [before me]. I cling to your instruction; ADONI, don't let me be put to shame! I will run the way of your **mitzvot**, for you have broadened my understanding.

So, it's a big step, committing to love Him and His mitzvot and walk in His covenant. God meets us at **transition points**, so we have ceremonies.

1. Handling disagreements

The most important benefit of a good confrontation is that it preserves love in a relationship. This may seem counterintuitive to you. You may think, "This doesn't make sense.

When I confront someone, they will either get mad or leave the relationship." This can and does happen. But

confrontation was not designed to make someone angry or chase him or her away. In fact, it was designed to do the opposite.

The Latin term for confrontation means "to turn your face toward, to look at frontally." It merely indicates that you are turning toward the relationship and the person. You are face-to-face, so to speak. **So, face your fearsome people**.

In confrontation, people simply face the relationship and deal with an aspect of the connection that needs to be addressed. The intent is to make the relationship better, to deepen the intimacy, and to create more love and respect between two people.

That is why, to be an effective confronter, you need to understand that confrontation works best when it serves love. Boundary conversations are motivated and driven by love. They promote the purposes of love. They enhance a relationship, not end it.



 - Anti-Semitism
 - Opposition to you as a Jew, opposition to you as a Yeshua believer and follower.

Deut. 31:7 "Moses called Yehoshua and said to him before the eyes of all Israel: **Be strong and**Courageous for you will come with (et) this nation to the land that God promised to their forefathers to give to them and you will bequeath it to them."

In the first verse, Moses says to Yehoshua "you will come", while G-d says to Yehoshua "you will bring."

In Hebrew there is a slight difference in the spelling and pronunciation of these two verbs.

תָבוא and תָביא

TAVEE TAVO

[Why is there a difference in the usage of this verb between the two verses?]

The Sages state: When Moshe said to Yehoshua -

ַהַגָּה הָעָם אֶת אַתָּה תָּבוֹא כִּי...

"For you will come (et) this nation" – the meaning is:

"For you will come with this nation" (together with this nation).

Here Moshe intended that Yehoshua would take counsel with the elders of the nation, and act according to their opinion.

But, when G-d told Yehoshua:

"For you will bring (et) this nation"

Here the verb מְּבִיא is an active verb (Binyan Hif'eel) and the intention is that Yehoshua would actively lead the Children of Israel even against their will – the decision is his.

Rabbi Elchanan Wasserman:

In the beginning, the leader cannot rely just on his own opinion. He first needs to hear out the opinions and the advice of the elders and the sages.

But after hearing out all the opinions, the leader needs to demonstrate leadership and to decide by himself how to act.

Adult responsibilities:
