From Vision To Mission

Israel's high-powered laser interception system, dubbed "Iron Beam," has been declared operational after completing development and final tests, and is set to be delivered to the military by the end of the year, the Defense Ministry and manufacturer Rafael said on Wednesday.

The Iron Beam is not meant to replace the Iron Dome or Israel's other air defense systems, but to supplement and complement them, shooting down smaller projectiles and leaving larger ones for the more robust missile-based batteries such as the David's Sling and Arrow systems.

In a symbolic move, the ministry renamed the system in Hebrew from Magen Orאון אור (light shield) to Or Eitan אוֹר אֵיתָן (Eitan's light), after Cpt. Eitan Oster, 22, a commander in the Egoz Commando Unit,

who was killed fighting Hezbollah in southern Lebanon in October 2024. Eitan Oster's father... was among the "initiators and developers" of the Iron Beam project, the ministry said.

Moreover, unlike Israel's current interception systems, which cost tens of thousands of dollars per missile, the laser system costs one to two dollars per shot.

And there is no limit to ammunition, as long as there is electric power.

Although Raytheon in the US, as well as England, Russia, China, Germany, and Japan, are all at various stages of developing laser defense systems, the ministry said on Wednesday that Iron Beam is the only one that has moved beyond test firings to actual use in the field.





From Avner Boskey, senior Messianic scholar and musician, living near Beersheva, Israel: "Herod wanted to kill John, but he was afraid of the people, because they considered John a prophet" (Matthew 14:5)



Those who hated Charlie, hated him with a passion. John the Baptist confronted Herod over his unlawful taking of his brother's wife. Kirk spoke against sexual sin just like John the Baptist did. They both paid with their lives.

Herod eventually had John beheaded. I saw a report about Charlie Kirk's death, about whether he suffered pain or was aware of what happened to him when he was shot in the neck. The severing of the jugular vein and carotid artery leads to nearly instantaneous death. The brain doesn't have the chance to register the pain.

Charlie Kirk took it in the neck, in a way very similar to John the Baptist. John the Baptist was a beacon of truth in the midst of a faithless and twisted generation. So too was Charlie Kirk. The 'love grown cold' of our times is seen in the perversity of some of the depraved and mocking responses to Kirk's death. This too is a sign.

"And because lawlessness will be increased, the love of many will grow cold" (Matthew 24:12)

Beni Harmony, an ABC new anchor, paid an impassioned tribute to Kirk, whom she knew personally, during a Sept.12 segment on ABC20's Marketplace program.



"I want you to know that it's OK if you feel sadness, it's OK if you're grieving," the host told her TV audience. "I want to share with you one of my favourite sayings that Charlie would always tell us at the office, he would yell it from the mountain-tops, so please listen:

When conversations stop happening, when individuals become wordless, that's when violence begins. So, if you do one thing today, make it be with passion, with conviction. Stand up for your friends, stand up for your beliefs, and speak loudly, even if your voice shakes. Your words have meaning, your values have purpose. Never forget that.

According to a post Harmony made three days later, she was suspended by her network [ABC] for the tribute to her former employer, whose assassination on a Utah college campus on Sept. 10 made national headlines.

"Many in the mainstream media have been fired or punished for mocking his assassination," Harmony wrote in a Sept. 15 post on X.

"I believe I am the first to be targeted for honoring him on air.

Yet, my encouragement is this: stand firm. Not in your own strength or fleeting resolve, but in Messiah — His unshakable character, His eternal purposes. The Lord is weaving something profound through this tragedy, in ways we could scarcely have imagined or predicted

Across social media and news outlets, a groundswell is emerging. People are confessing, "I've never been to church, but I'm feeling a pull to attend a Sunday service." Friends and family have shared with me that their churches were overflowing this past Sunday, a phenomenon echoed nationwide.

Alongside this, lifelong atheists and skeptics are turning to prayer and seeking out Bibles. Even those once aligned with the Democratic Party or liberal ideologies are declaring, "No more." Christians who shared Charlie's convictions are emerging from the shadows,

It's what we were made to do. Ambassadors for Messiah is who we were made to be. Speak the truth.





Martyrs: a person who sacrifices something of great value and especially life itself for the sake of principle

Kefa Peter – Crucified upside down in Rome under Nero because he felt unworthy to die in the same manner as Messiah.

Andrew – Crucified on an X-shaped cross in Greece, preaching the gospel until his last breath.

Yaakov James (son of Zebedee) – Beheaded in Jerusalem, the first apostle martyred (Acts 12:2).

John – The only apostle believed to have died a natural death, though he suffered exile and persecution on Patmos.

Thomas – Tradition says he was speared to death in India while preaching the gospel. [Jonathan Cahn went to that mountain to blow shofar and break the curse.]

Philip – Martyred in Asia Minor, possibly by crucifixion.

Bartholomew (Nathanael) – Reportedly flayed alive and then beheaded for his faith.

Matthew – Tradition says he was killed in Ethiopia while ministering.

Yaakov James (son of Alphaeus) – Thrown from the temple pinnacle and then beaten to death.

Thaddeus (Jude) – Martyred in Persia. Simon the Zealot – Tradition says he was sawn in half.

**Matthias** (who replaced Judas) – Stoned and beheaded for preaching Messiah.

Stephen (Acts 7) –, stoned for proclaiming Messiah. His prayer for his persecutors echoed Yeshua's own words from the cross.

Polycarp (c. 69–155 AD) – Bishop of Smyrna, burned at the stake at age 86, declaring, "Eighty and six years have I served Him, and He has done me no wrong."

William Tyndale (1494–1536) – Burned at the stake for translating the Bible into English so ordinary people could read God's Word.

David Brainerd (1718–1747) – Though not killed violently, his early death at 29 from illness after missionary labors among Native Americans inspired countless to go to the mission field.

Jim Elliot & Nate Saint (1956) -Martyred while taking the gospel to the Waodani [Auca] people of Ecuador. Elliot's words still ring: "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain that which he cannot lose."

Martin Luther King Jr. (1968) – On April 4, 1968, King was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee, at just 39 years old. His death echoed the truth that standing for righteousness often comes with a price. Like the prophets of old, he lifted his voice against injustice, and like so many martyrs before him, he paid for it with his life.

## Rachel Joy Scott & Cassie Bernall (1999) - Teenagers killed in the Columbine school shooting, remembered for boldly confessing Messiah in their final moments.

Charlie Kirk (2025) - Charlie Kirk's murder makes him a modern-day martyr. His stance for Christ and Christian values and debating in the public square, standing against the tide of liberalism.

Turning Point USA (TPUSA), Charlie's organization, has been inundated with over 37,000 new chapter requests since his assassination. The New York Post reported this "would increase TPUSA's presence on campuses by nearly twentyfold."

From London to Seoul: Movement goes worldwide as thousands march chanting 'We Are Charlie Kirk' The assassination of Charlie Kirk sent shockwaves through conservative circles worldwide. Vigils and rallies followed almost immediately in cities from London to Seoul and Canberra, with supporters chanting "We Are Charlie Kirk."

Google searches for TPUSA spiked dramatically — first after the tragedy, then surging 455% following Erika Kirk's first public remarks. Viral videos of Charlie sharing the gospel on college campuses are spreading, and vigils honoring his legacy are being held worldwide.

1 Peter 3:15 states, "But in your hearts honor Messiah the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect.

## A 16-year-old Australian

As a 16-year-old, I loved Charlie Kirk. I loved what he stood for, the way he debated students with both firmness and respect, but most of all, how he always put his Christian faith before anything else. I spent hours watching his three-hour-long videos of campus debates, wishing he would one day come to Australia.

The morning my parents walked into my room to tell me that my hero had died-because someone couldn't handle the truth he was speaking—I broke down in tears.

Going to school that day was one of the hardest things I've ever done. The first conversation I overheard was students mocking him, openly saying they weren't sad about his death. It took every ounce of selfcontrol not to react in anger. I knew my emotions were too raw.

Later that day, after I had time to process, grief gave way to courage. I wanted to be more like him—to speak truth boldly, to stand for my faith no matter the cost. That very day I had political discussions. For the first time in a long time, I spoke with my teacher and peers about abortion. They disagreed with me, but I carried the conversation with civility and conviction, drawing strength from Mr. Kirk's example.

Never again will I stay silent. Never again will I back down. Never again will I cower when it comes to speaking truth and standing for my faith.

To the young people reading this: be bold. The Bible calls us to boldness, to proclaim Christ, and to lead others to Him. Don't be afraid to speak the truth, and speak it well—that is what God has called us to do

He tirelessly went from campus to campus, from Oxford to Utah, dialoging with any student who wished to debate him. Using his vast reservoir of facts and his exceptionally speedy and articulate mind,

He gave them what seemed to be unlimited amounts of time, and then calmy eviscerated all their anti-American, anti-Western, and anti-Judeo-Christian positions.





Turning Point USA announced on Sept. 18 it has named Erika Kirk as the new CEO and board chair of Turning Point USA, which her late husband, Charlie Kirk, co-founded. Erika Kirk was elected unanimously as the new leader of the organization, which was founded in 2012.

Before her connection to Charlie Kirk and TPUSA, Erika Kirk, a 36year-old mother of two, Erika won the Miss Arizona pageant in 2012, and before that was an NCAA Women's Basketball athlete, and also worked as a model and actress in New York City and China. She launched Everyday Heroes Like You, a 501(c)(3) organization, in 2006, when she was just 17 years old. The group's mission is to promote "everyday heroes" in communities around the nation.

Erika Kirk's group went global with its "Romanian Angels" project, where it teamed up with the U.S. Marine Corps to sponsor an orphanage in Constanta, Romania.

The new TPUSA CEO earned a double major in political science and international relations from Arizona State University, and later received her Juris Master's Degree in American Legal Studies from Liberty University. She's currently pursuing a Doctorate in Biblical Studies from the same university.
